ASSITEJ Artistic Gathering for 2016 Such a Success.

July 2-9th was an incredible week, if you were with us, thank you for helping make On The Edge, the ASSITEJ Artistic Gathering for 2016 such a success. The festival was testimony to the fact that bringing people together for the purpose of theatre for young audiences can be a very special thing.

On The Edge took place in Birmingham (the UK's 2nd largest city), at Birmingham Repertory Theatre and at the City University as well as a number of other venues across the city. It included; 16 productions, 9 works in progress presentations, 91 performances to over 9,500 audience members, 56 symposium events with 100 speakers. It was attended by 400 delegates from 51 countries including 160 artists from 25 companies.

Something profound happens when you are able to immerse yourself in a week's worth of artistic experiences which acknowledge and value the position of children and young people. The impact of the work and the sense of community the festival created was perhaps more heightened because of recent events in the UK surrounding BREXIT and the negative, divisive campaign which may now see the UK leaving the European Union. This is something that has shocked and appalled arts communities across the UK and also Ireland, and we now grapple with whatever this new reality means.

The loss of funding streams is potentially damaging for arts and culture in particular, but it is the idea that our collective identity as outward looking, diverse and international has been diminished which hurts the most. As well as the prospect of real, physical borders.

Festivals not only act as a platform to showcase great work which ignites the senses, but they also bring people together over shared values. This has never felt more important than in the week of the aptly named "On The Edge".

This was the first time that an ASSITEJ Festival has taken place in either Ireland or the UK, and the first time an ASSITEJ Artistic Gathering has been the rationale for a special, once-off event. Festivals such as Kijimuna (Japan) Schaxpìr (Austria) and Augenblick-mal (Germany) have all hosted the ASSITEJ Gathering as part of a festival which is already happening.

On The Edge brought TYA UK and TYA Ireland together for something new, and many, many people generously contributed to the festival's planning, development and delivery. It became a collectively owned celebration of good work and shared values. The festival and symposium did that thing of creating the conditions for meaningful discussion and international exchange, which is at the heart of ASSITEJ.

Our festival, like many others, brought people together to witness what someone else has described as 'the best of humanity'. However, like Facebook which acts like a mirror for all our own beliefs and values (also pointed out by someone else), it is a welcome cocoon - and now we have to gather strength and face the ongoing challenges presented by the outside world

The ASSITEJ Award for Artistic Excellence/Honorary Presidents' Award is given every three years for noteworthy achievement in the field of theater for children and young people, and is the most prestigious award given by the organization.

The award is given to an individual or to a company working in the field of Theater for Children and Young People, nominated by either their national ASSITEJ Center or by a professional network, which is a Full Member of ASSITEJ. **The Award for Artistic**Excellence is based on innovative work done in the three years prior to the application deadline. The committee adjudicating the award will give special priority to emerging artists, new and exciting companies, although established individuals or theaters that begin working in a new and innovative way will also be considered.

Applause for Lifetime Achievement ASSITE| New Award

Opportunity

This award recognizes those who have played a distinctive and inspiring role in the world of TYA - whether as artist, designer, producer, technician, administrator, teacher, facilitator, mentor - for their outstanding body of work over time, and for their profound and lasting contribution to theatre for young audiences in their country or region. This award recognises the long, prominent, and influential career of the person concerned, and his or her particular commitment to the development of theatre for young audiences.

Who can nominate?

Each full member of ASSITEJ (national centre or network) can put forward ONE individual for this award in any three year period.

Who can win the award?

Up to three individuals can be given the ASSITEJ "Applause for Lifetime Achievement" during any given term. The award will not be given posthumously.

How is this different from ASSITEJ Honorary Members?

This award is distinct from ASSITEJ Honorary Membership, which is bestowed on persons who have made a significant and lasting contribution to the life of the organization, ASSITEJ, specifically, rather than to the field of theatre for children and young people more generally.

The title of the 19th ASSITEJ World Congress and Performing Arts Festival is the 'Cradle of Creativity', based in Africa for the first time in ASSITEJ history. Welcoming everyone back to the cradle of humanity, this event will profile Africa's best in theatre for children and youth, alongside performances from other continents.

ASSITEJ was first created because of a desire for intercultural collaboration during the period of the cold war. In the 21st century, this desire for collaboration across borders, languages, ethnicities, and personal histories seems more urgent than ever.

This magazine calls for articles that

- Develop and illustrate intercultural exchange, collaboration, social change, diversity, and transformation in TYA;
- Examine connections between traditional/contemporary and local/global theatrical practices in TYA;
- Discuss the merits and disadvantages of intercultural exchange with regards to globalization, artistry, power, cultural norms and values in TYA.

Articles should

- Be between 500-700 words maximum and sent in Word and PDF (both). Times 12pt font.
- Include a title and the name of the author at the top, and a 25 word bio of the author at the end.
- All files should be named by last name of author and country.
- Submissions should be in English and in the original language of the author.
- Be accompanied by high quality photos in separate files from the article, TIFF preferred but JPEG is acceptable:

TIFF - size of the photo should not be less than 5 MB.

JPEG - Non compressed, 300 DPI - 14 x 21 cm (8 1/2 x 5 1/5 inches).

• Photos should be credited with name of photographer, company, and play.

Deadline for submissions is OCTOBER 15, 2016.

The focus of the award is flexible depending on the theme of each ASSITEJ World Congress and Festival

The focus of the 2017 award is "Intercultural Exchange."

- 1.- Any ITYARN member may submit a nomination for consideration.
- 2.- Those nominated must be individuals who, either working independently or in collaboration with others, have made significant contributions to the body of research in theatre for young audiences under this theme.
- 3.- Those nominated must be recommended by the nominator and at least 2 established researchers (PhD or equivalent) through letters of support that highlight the nominee's achievements in respect of their research relating to this theme.
- 4.- The nomination should include a research CV of the nominee
- 5.- The nominee may or may not be aware of the nomination.
- 6.- All nominations will be held in confidence by the ITYARN Board. The nominators will be informed of the results by the ITYARN Chair.
- 7.- It is the responsibility of the ITYARN Chair to inform the recipient of the award. This will include the names of the individual who made the nomination and the recommenders. The recipient will be honored at the ASSITEJ Awards Ceremony
- 8.- All nomination materials must be submitted by the deadline November 10, 2016

Highlighting the importance of playwriting in all its manifestations around the world, ASSITEJ will honor up to three persons as "ASSITEJ Inspirational Playwrights" every three years at its World Congress, starting in Cape Town in May 2017. This will be



administered and adjudicated by the Write Local Play Global network in coordination with the ASSITEJ Executive committee.

The essence of our work is telling stories on our stages, and this award is created to honor particular writers who have inspired theatre for young audiences in their city, their country, their region, or all over the world.

How they have been inspirational could be very particular and individual, including:

- Writing a play or plays innovative in content and/or form that helped transform TYA in their country
- · Serving as a mentor and role model to other writers
- Writing politically or socially aware work that challenges entrenched tradition or power in their country or region
- Through their writing, encouraging audiences to see other people, the world and its events in a more profound and human way.
- it will be the individual nominator who will 'tell the story' of how the playwright they nominate has been inspirational

Honoring up to three inspirational playwrights at each Congress allows ASSITEJ to celebrate its broad membership of different genders, ages, backgrounds, cultures, regions and languages. ASSITEJ members come from small and large countries, work for and with different ages of young audiences, and create theatre by a multitude of varied processes. The ASSITEJ Inspirational Playwrights will reflect not only the diversity in form and subject matter of playwriting around the world, but also its global membership of talented playwrights and theater makers.

In addition to the ceremony/reception at which the inspirational playwrights are named, the organizers of the Congress will be invited to work with the EC, WLPG and the selected playwrights to showcase their work in a creative manner, such as performances, translations, readings, etc.

On The Edge ASSITEJ Next Generation Residency, **A Testimony**

They say (I've no idea who 'they' are) that "a change is as good as a holiday" and after nine days in Birmingham I can honestly say that I've never been more delighted to be exhausted. Exhausted but enthused, tired but thankful and the Next Generation programme as part of On The Edge Festival/ASSITEJ International Gathering is the change I needed and am grateful for.

I almost didn't apply. Open to "young and emerging artists interested in the practice of theatre for young audiences and international collaboration" I had written myself off (I'm 33⅓ in an Irish accent) but I read further. I wanted a shot at stepping in to the worlds hinted at in the bullet points of the call out. Rarely are such opportunities available to people who perhaps have already 'emerged' in one way but, like me, found a new area of arts practice and passion and were as ripe for the learning as anyone else. I won't lie, I was also looking forward to the many shows on offer as part of the programme. All of them. Being handed an envelope of tickets bearing the promise of multiple show days carefully scheduled around workshops with my next gen friends and colleagues with a fair few symposium sessions squeezed in for good measure felt like such a treat. For someone who jokes about spending much of her time facilitating other people's creativity, I was ready to play and it's just as well, as we dove straight in from day one.

We came from all over. Almost. Some of our cohort-to-be were denied visas and less than a week after the Brexit vote, this resonated more than it might have a week previously. I experienced many moments during the week when I realized that the stakes are high, for some more than others and that those of us lucky enough to be working in a country where we can do, say and go as we please have a responsibility to find ways to support and encourage those who aren't.

- ... everyone pronounces its magic name wrongly (and enjoys doing so) and it sounds wonderful how many people on podiums, at openings and reception pronounce the name wrongly all at the same time. That makes it sound like a promise, an energy that leads to exciting experiences.
- \ldots theater for children and young people theater is theater for everyone.
- ... it is not self-evident that there is such a thing as professional theater for young audiences.
- ... it is important to grow together and become closer especially at times of global changes that make the world seem bigger and smaller at the same time. It is important how things are organized locally and nationally and we can meet others, strangers, the "other" and the unknown, ask questions and create a better "we".
- \dots this association is about support, decency and continuity in times of a cultural mainstream that might lose its power to inspire.

- ... we have to work together in order to create good work, be precise and contribute, aesthetically and with the choice of our topics and themes.
- \dots it means exchange and reflection, together about new and old ideas, it means to think over, to think forward, to think through, to ask and to encounter people and ideas.
- ... theater for children and young people is ancient, but also a newcomer among older traditions and established institutions that might claim to create theater for young audiences but are not interested in knowing more about our work and our professional experience.
- ... we educate each other, learn from each other, discover what is right and wrong and yet, we still eat French fries now and then, just because they taste good.
- ... it's the most beautiful network I know, because it gives me the opportunity to learn about new, old, boredom, suspense, sadness, fun, excitement, unknown and profane, complex and transcultural, intercultural and mixed-cultural (please continue extending this list, it could become a fun experiment...).
